Solomon Asked for Wisdom

Bible Passage: 1 Kings 2-3

Memory Verse: ⁵ If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to

all without finding fault, and it will be given to you. James 1:5

Bottom Line: I turn to God for wisdom because He helps me make good decisions. **Big Picture Question:** What does God know? God knows everything about the past,

present, and future.

Christ Connection: Solomon was a wise king who wanted to do God's plan. Solomon wasn't perfect, but God had a plan to give His people a greater and wiser king—His Son, Jesus. Jesus completely trusted God. Jesus surrendered His own life to die on the cross for our sins.

10 Minutes SOCIAL: SETTING THE TONE OF THE EXPERIENCE

Pick A Sticks

What You Need: pick up sticks set or colored toothpicks/popsicle sticks(1 set per group), Pick a Stick Act Pg (1 per group)

What You Do:

- Place the sticks in the middle of the table.
- If playing with pickup sticks, you will drop the sticks and each kid gets to try to pick up a stick without moving any other sticks. If they move, then the next player tries. If they don't move they get to answer a question based on your Pick a Stick act pg and the color they picked up. If other colored sticks, you decide how to play.
- Play till everyone gets at least one turn.

What You Say "Welcome to All Star Kids. We are so happy to have you in our group this year. We are going to spend the next few weeks playing this game, so that we can get to know each other better. I am so excited for our year together. Let's see what is going on in Large Group today."

10 Minutes Worship: CELEBRATING WHAT GOD IS DOING

SONGS, OFFERING AND PRAYER

15 Minutes LARGE GROUP: COMMUNICATING GOD'S TRUTH IN ENGAGING WAYS

The downfall of David's kingdom was propelled by David's sin with Bathsheba. Amid the pain of losing their firstborn son, God showed David and Bathsheba that He still loved them. Bathsheba gave birth to Solomon. God chose Solomon to be Israel's next king. (See 2 Sam. 12:24-25; 1 Chron. 22:9-13.)

David spoke to his son from his deathbed, giving specific instructions: "Keep your obligation to the LORD your God to walk in his ways" (1 Kings 2:3a). After 40 years of reigning over Israel, David died and Solomon became Israel's king.

Early in Solomon's reign, God appeared to him in a dream. "What should I give you?" God asked. Solomon's response set him apart from many other kings. His God-honoring qualities were apparent. First, Solomon humbly acknowledged his lack of experience in leading God's people. Then he said, "Give your servant a receptive heart to judge your people and to discern between good and evil. For who is able to judge this great people of yours?" (1 Kings 3:9).

If you were a king or queen and God offered to give you anything you asked for, what request would you make? Ask the kids you teach what they would ask for if they could receive anything their hearts desired. One might assume that a king would ask for power or for victory over his enemies. Perhaps he would ask for riches or to live a long life. Solomon asked for none of these. Instead, he asked God to make him wise. God was pleased with Solomon's request, and He agreed to give Solomon a wise and understanding heart.

Solomon's heart was surrendered to God. Solomon was a wise king who wanted to do God's plan. Solomon wasn't perfect, but God had a



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plan to give His people a greater and wiser king—His Son, Jesus. Jesus completely trusted God. Jesus surrendered His own life to die on the cross for our sin.

TEACHING FOCUS (1 Kings 2-3)

David was the king of Israel for many years. His son Solomon was going to be king after Him. Before King David died, he gave Solomon some instructions.

"Be strong and brave, Solomon," David said. "Obey God, and you will be successful. God will keep His promise that every king of Israel will come from our family." When David died, Solomon became the king of Israel.

One night, God appeared to Solomon in a dream. God said, "Solomon, ask for anything you want, and I will give it to you."

Anything? A king might have asked to live a long life or to have lots of riches. Solomon could have asked God to give him victory over all his enemies. But Solomon did not ask to be rich or to have a long life. Solomon wanted to be a good king. He asked for something even better

Solomon prayed, "God, I am young, and I do not know very much about being a king. Please make me wise and obedient to You. Help me know the difference between right and wrong. Help me lead Your people well."

God was happy with Solomon's request. God said, "I will give you wisdom. In fact, I will make you more wise and understanding than anyone who has ever lived. No one in the future will ever be as wise as Solomon."

God also said, "Because you asked for wisdom, I will also give you what you did not ask for: long life, riches, and honor. You will be greater than any other king during your lifetime."

Then Solomon woke up. He praised God and offered sacrifices to worship Him.

Christ Connection: Solomon was a wise king who wanted to do God's plan. Solomon wasn't perfect, but God had a plan to give His people a greater and wiser king—His Son, Jesus. Jesus completely trusted God. Jesus surrendered His own life to die on the cross for our sins.

TODAY'S TAKEAWAYS

- If God offered to give me anything I asked for, I think I might ask for something selfish like riches, power, or good heath. Solomon did not ask for those things. Solomon asked for wisdom.
- Wisdom is more than just knowing a lot, it is understanding how to use what you know to make the best choices.
- God is the source of all wisdom.
- Because God knows everything about everything, He always does what is best.
- BL: I turn to God for wisdom because He helps me make good decisions.

Give kids a chance to believe in Jesus for the first time. Remind them that God loves them so much that He sent Jesus to earth to pay for their sins. Lead them to pray as you pray. Pray that believers will submit their lives to the Holy Spirit, follow Jesus, and tell others about Him.

25 Minutes SMALL GROUPS: CREATING A SAFE PLACE TO CONNECT **Discussion Questions**:

- What did David tell Solomon about God? (to obey Him; that He would keep His promises; 1 Kings 2:3-4)
- What did Solomon ask God for? (wisdom to lead, 1 Kings 3:9)
- What did God give Solomon? (wisdom as well as riches and honor, 1 Kings 3:12-13)
- What is the difference between knowledge and wisdom? Guide kids to discuss the nature of
 knowing information versus knowing how to use information in the best way. Remind them that
 if a person knows the right things but still does the wrong things, he is not wise. Talk about
 God's perfect knowledge and perfect wisdom.
- Why does God want us to have wisdom? Guide kids to see that behaving wisely glorifies God and benefits us. When we behave foolishly, we dishonor God and hurt ourselves. God wants us to glorify Him. and He loves us and doesn't want us to be hurt. Wisdom leads us to Jesus.



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When we love and obey Jesus, God is glorified.

Ultimately, wisdom comes from God. What are some ways God gives us wisdom? Guide kids to see that we can gain wisdom by studying God's Word, by spending time with other believers, by praying to God, and by listening to the Holy Spirit's guidance. Remind kids that the wisest decision we can make is the decision to put our faith in Jesus to save us.

Activity: When You Grow Up

What You Need: "When You Grow Up" Activity Page (1 per kid), crayons, pencils What You Do:

- Give each kid a paper.
- Ask them to draw what they will look like when they grow up.
- Get them to think about what their hair will look like, what they might wear for their job, maybe even draw where they will live in the background. Encourage creativity if possible.
- Discuss the skills and traits they will need for the jobs they hope to have.
- Help them write any of that information on their paper so families can enjoy their masterpieces.
- Put their name on their paper so they can take it home.

What You Say No matter what job you have, wisdom is a great attribute to have. Wisdom is the ability to use knowledge in the best way. Where do you think wisdom comes from? What did Solomon learn about wisdom today in our Bible Story?

Activity: Memory Verse Activity

What You Need: Memory Verse Poster, bucket, bean bags, tape

What You Do:

- Put the bucket on the floor near your small group area.
- Place a piece of tape on the floor to mark a throwing line.
- Kids will form a line behind the tape and attempt to throw the bean bag in the bucket.
- Each time a kid gets a bean bag in the bucket, the whole group says the memory verse together. You can give each kid one throw or you can let each kid throw until they make it in the bucket.
 - As play continues, you can say just one word at a time once they sink a bag, or wait until next week.

What You Say "Our memory verse comes from the New Testament. James was one of Jesus' half brothers, the son of Joseph and Mary. James knew that wisdom comes from God. In this verse we learn that God not only gives wisdom, He generously gives wisdom to people who ask for it! So what do you think we should pray about today? (wisdom?)"

Pray and Dismiss:

What You Need: no supplies needed

What You Say:

"Lord, thank You for being all-wise and good. We know that we can trust You completely. Help us to see the value of wisdom. Give us a desire to gain wisdom from You. We love You. Amen.

5 Minutes HOME: PROMPTING ACTION BEYOND THE EXPERIENCE

As adults arrive to pick up, encourage your kids to tell their parents about our Big Picture Question: What does God know? God knows everything about the past, present and future. So God can help us make good decisions when we turn to Him for guidance.
